Bí Cineálta

Thank you to all parents who engaged with our survey and focus group to help inform our preparations for our Bí Cineálta policy for dealing with and preventing bullying behaviour. In the New Year, we will work further on this with our students and staff to have the policy ready for implementation in September 2025.

As part of this process, parents were sent a link to complete a survey and below are the findings from this survey.

- 90.9% of parents/guardians have seen the current anti-bullying policy
- 95.5% know how to access the anti-bullying policy
- 100% know who to contact to report a case of bullying
- 100% have said that their children feel safe and know who to contact when they have a concern about bullying behaviour
- 100% feel that the school are committed to the prevention of bullying

Surveys completed by students and staff will also be taken into consideration for the formation of the new Bí Cinéalta policy over the coming months. Thanks you for your co-operation with this.

Child Safeguarding Statement - Our Child Safeguarding Statement and Risk Assessment is available on our school website, or a copy can be acquired by the school. The Designated Liaison Person (DLP) in Ballymurn NS is Ms. Emer O'Gorman and the Deputy DLP is Ms. Chloe Ormonde. If you have any concerns regarding child protection, please contact the DLP, or in her absence, the Deputy DLP.

Absences -Leanna has sent a text to all families containing the link for our back to school form, which must be filled in each time your child returns following an absence from school. This link is also available on our website, ballymurnns.ie, under the "Useful Information Tab" <u>https://forms.gle/8EzXYXDEk5SnVAH9A</u> As always, we must remind parents that we are obliged by law to report instances where children have been absent for a cumulative total of twenty days or more during the school year to Tusla.

Garda Vetting - It is a legal requirement that any parents who wish to be involved in school activities e.g. Rackard League, Hurling 365 etc., must be Garda vetted through the school. We realise that many parents are already Garda vetted through the G.A.A and other organisations, but unfortunately, everybody still needs to go through the school vetting process. If you would like to become involved and have not been vetted previously, please contact the school office for a form. This also applies if you are giving a lift to another child to matches

Parent Explainer - Child Protection

In Ireland schools follow strict Child Protection Procedures outlined by the Department of Education and TUSLA, the child and family agency, to ensure every child's safety. Here's an overview of the key details parents should understand:

1. What is child protection?

Child protection aims ensure that children are safe from harm, abuse or neglect. This includes safeguarding their physical, emotional and psychological wellbeing.

2. Who is responsible in schools?

Each school in Ireland has a Designated Liaison Person (DLP) and a Deputy DLP to handle child protection concerns. In our school:

- Emer O'Gorman is the Designated Liaison Person (DLP)
- Chloe Ormonde is the Deputy DLP acting as a back-up if Emer is on leave.

3. What happens if there is a concern?

If a staff member is concerned about a child's welfare, or a child makes a disclosure to a staff member, they report it to the DLP. The DLP reviews the concerns with the staff member to decide if it meets the threshold to refer the matter to Tusla. The DLP can consult the duty social worker to get advice on the situation. If the duty social worker advises to report, the matter will be reported to Tusla. All teachers are mandated persons, and if it meets the threshold, they are legally required to report, regardless of their personal thoughts. This reporting is always done in an unbiased way, without making

judgement on the situation, the likelihood of it being true or not, or any assumptions about the situation.

In most situations, parents will be informed that the report has been made by the school. In some situations, depending on the concern and the guidance provided by Tusla, a social worker will be the person to inform the parents.

If a report is made, Tusla will follow up with school and the parents. They may speak directly to the child first, or to the parents. In most situations, Tusla processes the report in a supportive manner and it is closed after some discussion/explanation.

In serious cases, Tusla or the Gardaí may become directly involved to ensure the child's safety.

4. How are staff trained?

All school staff receive mandatory child protection training under the Children First Act 2015. This training ensures that teachers and staff can recognise signs of abuse or neglect and respond appropriately. The school ensures that staff are regularly updated on the latest procedures.

5. What should parents know about reporting?

Teachers are mandated persons under Irish law. This means they are legally required/obliged to report concerns directly to Tusla. They do not have a choice. While schools encourage parents to discuss concerns with them, Tusla may act independently if necessary to protect a child's welfare.

6. How can parents support child protection efforts?

Parents are encouraged to maintain open communication with their children children and the school. If you notice changes in your child's behaviour or have concerns about their wellbeing, discussing these with the DLP or Deputy DLP ensures the school can take appropriate action. We are here to listen and the school will always have the child's welfare at heart when reporting or discussing any concerns.

7. What should parents do if they have Child Protection concerns about another child in the school?

Please discuss any concerns about children with the DLP.

CLIMB[®] – Children's Lives Include Moments of Bravery

A support programme dedicated to helping children cope with a parent's cancer diagnosis

Who is CLIMB for?

Children aged 5-12 years who are experiencing the impact of a parent's cancer diagnosis.

What is involved?

The CLIMB programme is carried out over six sessions by trained healthcare professionals.

The programme aims to strengthen children's ability to cope with the feelings associated with their parent's illness and it uses therapeutic art and play exercises to enable children to express their feelings.

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Benefits for Children

The CLIMB programme is designed for all children as a skill-building opportunity and helps children express the normal feelings of sadness, anxiety, and anger in a healthy way. It also aims to increase children's knowledge about cancer and helps with communication between the parents and children.

CLIMB offers children the chance to meet and share feelings with other children in similar situations, and learn that

"I'm not the only kid in school with a parent who has cancer".

Benefits for Parents

The CLIMB programme aims to provide parents with the peace of mind that the emotional needs of their children are being addressed during this challenging time in their lives.

- The CLIMB programme provides parents with:
- Reassurance that their children are getting the support and help they need to cope with those feelings.
- Emotional support of other parents who are dealing with similar issues.
