Class Reports

Ms O'Gorman's Infants

It's been a busy term in Junior and Senior Infants, and we have covered a lot of ground since Christmas!

The main themes that we have covered and used as part of our integrated play area were 'Polar Explorers' and 'The Farm'. The children learned lots about the Inuit and various polar animals. We covered the weather in Geography during this time, and the weather diaries kept by the children in January made for some bleak reading! We created some beautiful polar bear art, and explored the fabric and fibre strand of art to create some outfits that were suitable for the winter weather. We covered the themes of 'An Aimsir' agus 'Eádaí' sa Ghaeilge, and everybody is now very confident speaking as Gaeilge on these two topics. Some beautiful farm themed art work was created by the children too, and there are some very realistic pigs on display in the classroom at present. We learned about new life in Spring, and baby animals and plants. We are kicking off our Incredible Edibles programme this week, and we will keep you all updated as we endeavour to grow our own strawberries, potatoes and onions.

In English, we've been working on the comprehension strategy of 'prediction' and we've listened to some lovely farm stories. Our phonological awareness, phonics and reading has been progressing really well, and Junior Infants are very proud to be able to say they are now reading decodable readers at home each night, and really enjoying them. Senior Infants reading is also going from strength to strength. We continue to do lots of free writing, handwriting and dictation practise also.

The new Primary Maths Curriculum is being enjoyed by all in Infants, and everybody is really enjoying the playful learning experiences that we have been having, particularly during our maths stations time, when we are joined by Ms. Kehoe and Ms. Barrett.

In P.E., we've really enjoyed learning some new Gaelic Football skills with Dylan.

Ms Lawlor's 1st Class

Over the past two months the children have made fantastic progress with their cursive handwriting. They've been very enthusiastic and are making a big effort to learn the correct formation of the letters, writing them clearly and neatly. They are beginning to join the letters to write their names and words and very soon we'll be moving on to writing short sentences too.

Another new skill that they've made great strides in is Irish reading. Ms Sheehan's 4th and 5th have been pairing up with our class every Monday to read with their Irish books with them. This has been a fun way to practice our reading!

Our Aistear play has helped the children to learn more about rainforests, the weather and space. The children have created some lovely artwork such as tropical birds made from clay, toucan drawings and a printing of planet Earth in space. We have explored the Water Cycle and we are growing our own rainforest in bottle to observe how the water cycle works. We've discussed different weather patterns and how weather is measured. We were very excited to measure the rainfall and the children were fascinated by how acorns change according to the weather!

Even though the children have been busy learning, the highlight of the last few weeks was definitely their grandparents and parents visit to our classroom. That was the best day ever!

Ms Sutton's 2nd & 3rd Class

Hello from 2nd and 3rd class. A few weeks ago we did a sugar investigation on our teeth we looked at the sugar in food. We figured out that there is a lot of sugar in a chocolate cake!!
